It's time for the Friends of the Library fall book sale, which will be held at the East Corning Fire Hall on Route 352. The sale will run from Oct. 13-20.


Oct. 13 is a members only preview day. Individuals can get a jump on shopping by joining at the door for \$5; families for \$10.
